Demographics

Demographics Summary

Hooks Junior High School is located in the rural community of Red Bank which is in Northeast Texas and about two miles north of Hooks, Texas. Hooks is a small township that sits along the Red River in the northeast corner of Bowie County. Hooks is situated just a few miles west of the city of Texarkana. Currently, the total student population has been progressively increasing.

On October 17, 2024, there were 256 students enrolled in grades 5th through 8th

The economically disadvantaged population is 62%.

As of October 17, 2024, Hooks Junior High had 25 teachers, 4 paraprofessional support staff, 1 campus counselor, 2 campus administrators, and 2 other staff members. 21 teachers are classified as homeroom teachers. Homeroom classes have an average student: teacher ratio of 12:1.

Student Achievement

Student Achievement Summary

Hooks Junior High school employes an interventionist to increase student growth in Tier III math in grades 5th through 8th. Recently HJH implemented an intervention program for Tier III reading. We are adding new components for "Maneuvering in the Middle" as an additional recourse for math intervention. The Campus Improvement Committee along with RtI teachers and principals set out to improve RTI and accelerated instruction for all students campus wide, by adding an RTI class period to the instructional day. HJH strives to improve the effectiveness of Tier I and Tier II instruction to meet the educational needs of economically disadvantaged and focus student groups. Hooks Junior High will work to continue to improve the effectiveness of instruction as well as implementation of accommodations and modifications to meet the educational needs of students with special needs.

The State of Texas Education Agency has not released school ratings. Hooks Junior High School does not have a rating as of now. STAAR data from the 2023-2024 school year will be utilized to address student academic needs with accelerated targeted instruction to improve student growth and achievement for the 2024-2025 school year.

Student Achievement Strengths:

Hooks Junior High continues to rise above state averages in most all tested subjects on STAAR. Although TEA has not released the latest ratings, it is worth noting HJH earned distinction designations for outstanding performance in comparative academic growth and comparative closing the gaps for 2022. 92% of HJH parents believe the school provides engaging curriculum and instruction to students. 5th grade science scores and 7th grade math scores have increased greatly. With the vertical alignment of TEKS and teacher participation in ESC 8 cohort there is anticipation for eight grade scores to show growth on the horizon. Although HJH 8th grade science social studies took a dip in 2024.

Student Achievement Needs:

Hooks Junior High students have a need for increased student achievement and growth in 8th grade social studies and science. Teachers will increase differentiation of student instruction in all grade levels to provide for both intervention and enrichment. Math fluency will improve with the help of a new curriculum resource with an RtI component. There is a current need for improvement in 5th grade math STAAR scores. Increases for student growth in approaches, meets, and masters is needed.

School Culture and Climate

School Culture and Climate Summary

100% of HJH staff overall believe they work in a safe school. Hooks Junior High School is a diverse community with various cultures, backgrounds, and family structures. HJHS requires students to be respectful, encourages students to be honest, organized, neat, energetic, team working kids who set ambitious goals. 95% of parents say staff are willing to listen and make them feel welcome. While another 97% of parents say that staff hold the expectation that all students can learn and perform well in their child's school. Surveys indicate that 100% of students and staff feel that the HJHS campus is a safe environment in which to work. 93% of parents surveyed said they feel their child's school personnel recognize and address students who are misbehaving at Hooks Junior High School. Reports of bullying are evaluated systematically.

Curriculum, Instruction, Technology and Assessment

Curriculum, Instruction, Technology and Assessment Summary

HJHS shares the vision of the district to be a dynamic learning community vigorously pursuing student success, challenging all to achieve excellence in our ever-changing global society. The goal of 5th through 8th grade is to develop responsible and productive students by delivering appropriate and individualized educational experiences. Algebra 1 is offered to qualifying 8th grade students. Students who successfully complete the Algebra 1 course will earn high school credit. Seventh and eighth grade students will participate in our new Introduction to Agriculture and earn high school credits.

Curriculum guides are directly connected to the state standards (TEKS) and reflect the English Language Proficiency Standards (ELPS). The TEKS Resource system is used to guarantee that each objective is taught to the rigor and specificity required for success. The integration of technology into a hands-on curriculum engages students and adds to understanding.

Curriculum, Instruction, Technology and Assessment Strengths:

Hooks Junior High school teachers meet by subject to ensure vertical alignment for content is being taught. All classrooms have access to innovative technology to enhance instruction. All tested subjects have classroom sets of Chromebooks and Smart Pannells for students and teachers to use during instruction. 92% of parents and 95% of teachers are satisfied with the technology and instructional resources available to students and teachers. All students have access to a variety of educational software. HJHS has one lab with about 28 desktop computers in the lab. Internet and Wi-Fi are available for classroom use during instruction throughout the school. 92% of parents surveyed say they felt like elevated levels of engagement and relevant instruction are important at school. Grade level teams meet regularly to discuss student data, lesson plans, and best practices. Weekly class agendas and student grades are posted online for parents and students to access. 91% of parents surveyed are satisfied with their child's academic progress at HJH.

Curriculum, Instruction, Technology and Assessment Needs:

All students will be trained on Google Classroom to prepare them for future learning and instruction. Hooks Junior High will maintain, and upgrade technology as needed. HJH has 13 Chromebook carts for instructional utilization by all students. Every tested subject has a full classroom set for student use in academics. Staff will be trained to use recent technology and software as needed. 82% of parents feel like teachers are sensitive to their child's learning style. Teachers will continue to ensure differentiated instructional curriculum to address different learning styles in classrooms.

Family and Community Involvement

Family and Community Involvement Summary

At Hooks Junior High, parents and guardians are encouraged to form a team with their children's teachers to promote effective communication which will help meet the child's needs. The Remind APP is utilized for each grade level for student and parent communication. The Skyward Family Access has proven to be a useful tool for parents to monitor grades and absences. calendars, newsletters, agendas, weekly reports, and progress reports help to keep parents informed of homework, projects, and discipline.

Family and community Involvement Needs:

81% of parents surveyed felt teachers and school personnel inform their child and themselves regularly about how he/she is doing in school. Hooks Junior High school will work hard to help parents to be better informed about their child's academic progress. HJH will also be more diligent to better inform parents about educational opportunities for students. Each teacher will also communicate with parents 2 or more times, 1 per semester, about positive progress concerning their child.
